2. Salute to the Flag and Mayor's opening remarks.

Due to the number of people registered to speak, Mayor Wiza did not give his opening remarks.

3. *Persons who wish to address the Mayor and Council on specific agenda items other than a "Public Hearing" must register their request at this time. Those who wish to address the Common Council during a "Public Hearing" are not required to identify themselves until the "Public Hearing" is declared open by the Mayor.

Mayor Wiza reminded citizens to register at this time.

4. Persons who wish to address the Mayor and Council for up to three (3) minutes on a non-agenda item.

Mayor Wiza read an email from Ald. Heidi Oberstadt apologizing for missing City meetings this month due to the unexpected passing of her mother. She thanked Council, City Staff, and public for their support.

Sean Piette, 917 Washington Avenue, said this is his last semester as SGA President and wanted to speak on how the City and University can continue to work together. He said with the regional reconstructing, it would be a good idea to keep working closely. Mr. Piette said the enrollment drop at the University will be felt throughout the City in a number of areas. He said it has been great working with the Alders and thanked everyone for their patience, generosity, and hard work.

John Moe, City Clerk, reminded everyone that tomorrow is the Primary Election for Supreme Court, County Executive, and District 8 Alderperson. He said polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Cathy Dugan said the Portage County Library had its first planning session for their Strategic Plan. She said the Library is interested in identifying different ways to encourage people to use its resources including partnering with organizations. Ald. Dugan said the Strategic Plan will continue through the summer of 2018. She said if anyone wants to provide their thoughts, opinions, and concerns, they can do so through the Portage County Library website.

Ald. Kneebone wanted to give a shout-out to the Streets crew, for keeping roads salted and treated.

Ald. Johnson reminded those in District 5 that the polling location was moved to National Guard Armory on Jefferson Street.

5. Presentation by Jamie Kiener, Executive Director of Justiceworks; Programs overview and updates.

Mr. Kiener said he is the Director of Justiceworks, a non-profit organization that holds an offender accountable for the harm they have caused. He said the idea behind the program is for the offender to change their direction so they do not end back up in the court system. Mr. Kiener said Justiceworks created a program called Shifting Gears refurbish and sold donated bikes from police departments and residents. He said Shifting Gears started off as a jobs re-entry program but closed in 2017 due to a loss of volunteers. Mr. Kiener said Justiceworks also has mediators to help divert cases from court or not have law enforcement get involved. He said this helps with costs and the healing process. He said the idea is to try to avoid the conflict before it gets started. Mr. Kiener said Justice Works is in the Central Wisconsin Center for Non-Profits building at 1578 Strongs Avenue.

Jan Way, 1203 Wilshire Drive, said she owns property at 321 West Street and her tenant received a fine for not shoveling the snow. She said it would have been nice if the person had knocked on the door prior to shoveling and informed him he would have to shovel the snow or he'll get charged.

Nancy Roppe, 925 Smith Street, asked Common Council to deny the request for the Marmoset monkey. She said she provided information at the Public Protection meeting. She said the evidence she found, including the lack of insurance coverage by the requestor, is enough reason to deny the request.

Kenny Rozak, 7512 Rolling Hill Road, Custer, said he works for the Streets Department and spoke in favor of Dir. Lemke's request for the two new positions at the Water Utility Department. He said having the new employees at the same level of the pay plan with current employees makes sense for cross-training.

Jeff Rice 117 Edgewood Road North, Custer, spoke in regards to the plat at 525 Fourth Avenue. He said there have been concerns about what type of housing is being built as well as safety, traffic, and water runoff. Mr. Rice said Origin Builders is working to address those concerns. He urged Council to approve the subdivision plat. Mr. Rice said this would be a great opportunity for the City to build owner occupied housing close to downtown.

Ald. Dugan asked if Dir. Lemke could clarify Odessa Court connecting to municipal water and when and where the City can provide water and sewer service outside of City boundaries.

Dir. Lemke said this item is on the agenda because the property as it existed as whole fell into which properties could connect to municipal water prior to the subdivision. He said Chapter 13 of Codified Ordinance book lists the properties that could be or are already hooked up to municipal water. Dir. Lemke said because this is a gray area he wanted Council action on it.

Ald. Johnson thanked Mr. Rozak for bringing forward the issue of cross training and the new position. She suggested a higher wage for certain tasks at a future Personnel Committee meeting.

Mayor Wiza said the Personnel manager could not be at the meeting but thought there was a pay differential for employees who are doing a different task.

Dir. Beduhn said there is a pay differential; however, you have to be doing the job for two hours or longer.

Mayor Wiza said he would have Lisa Jakusz draft a pay differential memo and provide it to the alderpersons.

Ald. Johnson **moved**, Ald. Dugan seconded, to approve the consent agenda.

7. Consideration of Postponement of Isadore Street reconstruction project until 2019.

Ald. Jennings **moved**, Ald. McComb seconded to postpone the Isadore Street reconstruction project until 2019.

Ald. Jennings questioned why this was not brought up in 2016.

Ald. Johnson replied this was budgeted for in 2017 but did not get completed due to the many other scheduled projects in addition to a change in the Director of Public Works.

Ald. Jennings said anything that is done with Isadore Street should include modern ideas because it is a long term investment. She said she has had many conversations with Dir. Beduhn and felt blindsided at the Board of Public Works meeting because she asked if the project being postponed would cause any delays in future projects or if it would cause any problems. Ald. Jennings said Dir. Beduhn told her that it would not cause any delays. She thought it would be beneficial to postpone until 2019 so then further discussion can be had and new ideas can be brought forth.

Dir. Beduhn said the plan brought before Council is a plan that incorporates everyone's needs including the University. He said Isadore Street is not part of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan and there are no recommendations for bicycle facilities within the corridor. He said bicycles do use this street but not as much as nearby streets and said pedestrians use is much higher. Dir. Beduhn said the City needs to accommodate for the considerable amount of pedestrian traffic from commuting UWSP students. He said bicycles are considered a vehicle and can operate in the road way and that is why there is a higher concern for the pedestrian traffic. Dir. Beduhn said pushing the project back would delay other projects as there are not enough staff to accommodate it. He said the Council would then need to increase the funding to hire consultants to do the work. Dir. Beduhn suggested to proceed with the plan as presented.

Ald. Johnson said people do not ride their bikes down Isadore Street because it is in such terrible shape. She said Isadore Street does have the potential to become a great biking corridor due to its location. Ald. Johnson said she spoke with Dir. Beduhn to see if it would be possible to push the project back until 2019 and he said it would be possible to rearrange and combine projects.

Dir. Beduhn said this was the same conversation he had with Ald. Jennings and said he took it as if he would be put off or offended if the delay were to happen. He said he would not be because they will accommodate for what Council decides.

Ald. Nebel said she has biked Isadore Street a number of times and it is bumpy and one cannot use the sidewalks due to all the foot traffic. She thought it was important to consider an idea of adding a bike lane on Isadore Street so it would be a safer alternative to using Division Street.

Dir. Beduhn said the Council could remove parking; however, the City just paid thousands of dollars for the parking study and kiosks for the University area. He said Isadore Street is one of the highest used parking areas, thus highest revenue generating areas around the University. He said his understanding was that any revenue generated from the kiosks was promised to the University to be used to fix up roads near campus. Dir. Beduhn said he liked the idea and if they had the space to do it the City would be going with that design. He said that design would be great for Reserve Street. Dir. Beduhn said he would like to keep one side of the street available for emergency vehicles for when unfortunate circumstances arise.

Ald. Shorr asked Dir. Beduhn what the relationship is between this and future projects as he thought if Isadore Street is completed in 2019 they would still be in the spirit of the agreement with the University. Ald. Shorr asked what the options are for moving projects around.

Dir. Beduhn said there is rationale in which streets the City selects and the order in which the work is completed. He said the June 12 storm played a huge part in shuffling projects around.

Ald. Jennings asked if Isadore Street could be re-surfaced inexpensively.

Mayor Wiza said the City has different plans in place that should be followed to the best of their ability. He said the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan adopted by Council does not include Isadore Street. He said either the Council follows the plan or does not and make changes as needed. Mayor Wiza said last September the Council approved work on Isadore Street through the Road Maintenance Plan and if changes are wanted they should be done in the Capital process.

Mayor Wiza read an email from Trevor Roark, 601 Washington Avenue, apologizing for being unable to make the meeting. He said the City and University have an opportunity to work together to construct Isadore Street to become safer, modern, and to accommodate its primary users. Mr. Roark said BPAC recommended an alternative street design that would protect bicyclists from cars including a car parking lane and would protect pedestrians better than original design. He said this design would only require six inches of UWSP land. Mr. Roark said instead of reconstructing the road to accommodate cars and semi's first it should accommodate pedestrians first. He said if the City were to ask students which design they liked better he thought they would select the alternative design but due to lack of time a second opinion from the students and the public, they have not been a part of the conversation.

Mayor Wiza read an email from George Acker, Associate Planner at UWSP, who said UWSP has decided that bike lanes should not be included in the Isadore Street reconstruction project due to the cost of moving the sidewalks and underground utility lines. He said another reason is the safety of pedestrians, and not having proper equipment for the smaller size sidewalks.

Mayor Wiza read an email from Bernie Patterson, Chancellor of UWSP, who said this would require land to be transferred to the City and relocation of utilities at the

University's expense. Chancellor Patterson said all the changes would cost the University around \$ 623,000. He said the University does not oppose adding additional bike lanes but does not have the funding to add them on Isadore Street. Chancellor Patterson said if the City was interested in fully funding the reconstruction project the University would be interested in having a conversation.

Ald. Morrow thought the Council should move forward with this project. He said the Council should not wait as the road will only get worse. Ald. Morrow said students mainly walk through this corridor and drivers have to be cautious because the pedestrians are not always alert. He said with the project being 95% complete, the Council should proceed because it is ready to go.

Ald. Shorr said he is torn on this issue but he supports going ahead with this project so it does not hold things up.

Ald. Johnson said about 16-17% of Stevens Point residents use bicycles as their mode of transportation. She said the City needs to engage the community about infrastructure.

Ald. Phillips thought Council needs to move forward with this. He said the debate on removing parking is merely a striping issue and can be discussed over the next couple of months. He said the Council will not be able to widen the street because tax payers are not going to want to spend \$650,000 more to widen the street.

Ald. McComb said she is torn on this because she can picture it being a biking corridor but given the financial constraints she likes the idea of redesigning Division Street.

Ald. Dugan said Ald. Shorr's and Ald. McComb's ideas are compromises because Isadore Street would be too expensive to reconstruct. She also likes the idea of improving Division Street.

Ald. Kneebone said she likes the idea of making Division Street more of a corridor where people can walk and bike though she is concerned with how the Kmart development will impact traffic. She said the City has to go forward with this as they are so far along with the project.

Ald. Slowinski said he had a lot of questions regarding this project, the Kmart site redevelopment and how it will all flow together. He said Dir. Beduhn reassured him that he is working with the developers to make sure everything flows. Ald. Slowinski said he believes the road is designed correctly to accommodate what is there.

Ald. Jennings said this is a missed opportunity but is not going to spend the political capital on this.

Ald. Slowinski asked if Mayor Wiza could restate the motion.

Mayor Wiza said the motion is to postpone the Isadore reconstruction project until 2019 and was seconded by Ald. McComb.

8. Ordinance Amendment – Public Peace and Offenses Against Public Policy – Amend Deposit Amount for Possession of Marijuana and Possession Marijuana Paraphernalia (Section 24.43, 24.52 and 24.52(4)(a) of the RMC).

Mayor Wiza said the Council had voted in December to postpone this item until February.

Ald. McComb said the past few months she has been researching the issue of marijuana from its legal status in various municipalities to its efficacy in health use. She said two thirds of Americans support legal marijuana. Ald. McComb believed that lowering the forfeiture to \$5 would be fairer to adults who possess this substance and would send a signal to the state legislators about support for marijuana legalization. She said after communicating with City officials, fellow alders, and citizens that the City of Stevens Point is not ready to lower the civil forfeiture to \$5. She said she has learned that meaningful change on marijuana can only come at the State or National level. Ald. McComb urged supporters of decriminalizing or legalizing marijuana to contact their state legislators and vote for those who vote for legalization. She said she will keep her Facebook page updated with all this information.

Ald. McComb **moved**, Ald. Dugan seconded, to take no action on this ordinance amendment.

Mayor Wiza said he received a letter from the Portage County Coalition for Alcohol Use and Drug Abuse Prevention saying they are against the ordinance amendment. Mayor Wiza said another letter came from Troy Seppelt, Assistant Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs and Dean of Students at UWSP who said he is firmly opposed to the change in this ordinance.

John Lawrynk, 1924 Illinois Avenue, said he is speaking on behalf of the Stevens Point Police Department. He said he has been a police officer for over 19 years and has been a detective for 10 years. Detective Lawrynk said he always asks his drug overdose cases if they started with marijuana, and every one of them said they did. Detective Lawrynk said he tells his kids and other kids that if you do not try marijuana he will guarantee they will never become heroin addicts which is based off of what he has seen and who he has talked too. He said the City needs to have a deterrent for young people to not do this drug.

Joshua Rosenkranz, 1725 4th Avenue, said he believes the fines should be lowered for the City of Stevens Point because the State of Wisconsin is experiencing an opioid epidemic. He said we should not be focusing on low level drugs such as marijuana but on the opioid epidemic.

Mayor Wiza said he brought this resolution forward because it impacts us all. He said we need to do whatever we can to encourage reduction in our fossil fuel use and encourage renewable energy.

Ald. Johnson **moved**, Ald. Nebel seconded, to approve the resolution requesting Congress to enact a revenue-neutral fee on carbon in fossil fuels.

Ald. Slowinski said he does not understand why this resolution is coming to the alders on City Council. He said he hears the arguments and agrees with some of the information but does not know how the fees are going to be distributed and there are a lot of unknowns. Ald. Slowinski said the Council is a non-partisan body and sees this as a political agenda item. He said if this gets implemented this will affect where Stevens Point gets their electricity from.

Ald. Dugan said she is pleased and proud that Mayor Wiza brought this forward after working with Kent Hall.

Ald. Kneebone said climate change is not partisan, Democratic, nor Republican. She said we are paving the way for the future.

Ald. Johnson said this is a non-partisan issue. She said she has spoken with the Weston power plant and they will eventually be going to natural gas and no longer using coal. Ald. Johnson said this is for future generations and we need to be part of the solution rather than the problem.

Ald. Phillips said he cannot vote on anything that will increase his constituents' utility costs. He said there is a lot of hypocrisy voting for this while building a new bus garage on the east side of town has increased the City's carbon footprint by 2500 gallons of fuel a year. Ald. Phillips said the Council also elected to build a new City Hall rather than moving into an already owned City building on Michigan Avenue.

Mayor Wiza said this is not a partisan resolution but he is trying to do what is right. He said while the City is making increases in some areas they are decreasing in others. Mayor Wiza said the City has installed solar panels, decreased energy loss in the overhead door and switched to LED lights.

Ald. Slowinski said he is environmentally cautious but does not think this needs to be discussed at this level.

Ald. Nebel asked what voting for this means.

Ald. Jennings thanked Mayor Wiza for bringing this forward. She said everyone in every community needs to put pressure on the Federal government to act on climate change.

11. Resolution - Conditional use permit to utilize the Traditional Neighborhood Overlay District reduced setback standards to construct an addition onto the primary structure at 1910 Monroe Street.

Ald. Johnson **moved**, Ald. McComb seconded, to approve the resolution for the traditional overlay at 1910 Monroe Street.

12. Resolution - Conditional use permit to reduce the setback on one street frontage of accessory structures at 104 Second Street North.

Kent Worzalla, 1608 Woodview Drive, said he is accepting this conditional use permit under protest. He said he is going to move forward with a zoning variance but the 10 foot wide landscaping buffer will restricts the use of his land and business. Mr. Worzalla said this is not compatible and does not conform to the neighborhood. He proposed the City revert back to the original agreed upon sidewalk design which would also fix the drainage issues.

Mayor Wiza said if this is not what Mr. Worzalla wants he can withdraw his request.

Mr. Worzalla said that was fine. He said it was explained to him that this needs to happen to get to the next level.

Ald. Phillips **moved**, Ald. Johnson seconded, to approve the 10 foot setback for 104 Second Street North as recommended by the Plan Commission.

Ald. McComb **moved**, to approve to vacate a portion of Cedar Street and Shaurette Street.

15. Lease agreement between the City of Stevens Point and Northwest Counseling and Guidance Clinic for space at 933 Michigan Avenue.

Dir. Ostrowski said a revised lease agreement was sent last week. He said the only revision was that Northwest Journey would be paying for the renovations and the City would reimburse them for half of the cost. Dir. Ostrowski said this makes for a smoother and quicker process. He said he discussed with the Police Chief that the existing average occupancy of the students remain about where they are now which is 20 – 22.

Ald. Johnson asked Dir. Ostrowski if the number of occupants would be controlled by the state as well.

Dir. Ostrowski said the number of students is controlled by the number of staff they have.

Ald. Phillips asked Dir. Ostrowski if he had an estimated cost for repairs and where the City would get the funds to cover their share.

Dir. Ostrowski said he does not have the estimated costs as the project has not been bid yet.

Ald. Shorr **moved**, Ald. Jennings seconded, to approve the lease agreement between the City of Stevens Point and Northwest Counseling and Guidance Clinic for space at 933 Michigan Avenue.

Jeff Rice, 117 Edgewood Road North, Custer, urged Council to approve the development agreement.

Ald. Jennings **moved**, Ald. McComb seconded, to approve the development agreement between the City of Stevens Point and D-J Rice Development, LLC for a residential development at 525 Fourth Avenue.
